WBCA Boys' All-State Teams

Division 1 WBCA All-State

A quartet of players lead the Wisconsin Basketball Coaches Association Division 1 boys basketball All-State Team as repeat selections: John Kinziger of De Pere, Jackson Paveletzke of Kimberly, Seth Trimble of Menomonee Falls, and Mac Wrecke of Arrowhead.

Kinziger led De Pere to an outright conference title in the FRCC, 25-3 overall record, and appearance in the sectional finals. The 6'0" junior has already scored more than 1500 points in his career, averaging 21 per game this season to go with 4.2 rebounds and 3.9 assists. He shot 52% from the field, 46% from three, and 86% from the free throw line.

Paveletzke was third in the state in scoring this season, leading Division 1 with 30 points per game. That included three games of at least 45 points, including a career-high 50 against De Pere. A very efficient scorer, he shot 58% overall, 81% from the free throw line, and 45% from deep.

Trimble was recently announced as the 2022 Mr. Basketball by the WBCA after guiding the Phoenix to a Greater Metro Conference title and appearance in the school's first-ever appearance in the state tournament. The 6'3" senior went over 2000 points for his career, averaging 26.2 per game as a senior to go with 7.4 rebounds and 4.2 assists per contest.

Wrecke is a three-year varsity standout for Arrowhead, averaging more than 20 points per game each of the last two seasons. As a repeat All-State pick, he averaged 20.7 points, 4.0 rebounds, and 2.1 assists per game in his senior campaign.

Leon Bond was part of Wauwatosa East's state title team last season and was asked to take on more of the scoring load as a senior. He increased his output from 11 points per game as a junior to 21 as a senior, as the 6'6" Virginia recruit added 6.3 rebounds and 2.1 steals per game as well.

Demarion Burch of Milwaukee Hamilton was the fourth leading scorer in the state this year and second in Division 1 with 29.7 points per game. The 6'3" junior guard added 7.1 rebounds and 4.8 assists per contest for the Wildcats.

Steven Clay of Menomonee Falls joined teammate Seth Trimble as WBCA All-State picks and one of the most dynamic duos in the state. The 6'5" wing player averaged 19.3 points per game in his senior season, finishing his career with more than 1600 points as the team made the state tournament and won a conference championship.

Tyran Cook helped Waukesha South to a surprising outright league title in the Classic Eight Conference, as the Blackshirts finished 22-6 overall. The conference Player of the Year, Cook averaged 22.5 points and 7.8 rebounds to lead the team.

Chevalier Emery was the leading scorer this season as Neenah won its first state championship in more than 40 years. The lightning quick point guard averaged 18.3 points per game, showing considerable improvement in all facets. An 83% free throw shooter, he also led the Rockets with four steals per contest.

Max Nelson of Appleton North was one of the most productive big men in the state this season, averaging 23.7 points and 11.6 rebounds per game. It marked the second straight year he averaged at least 20 and 10 for the Lightning. The Valparaiso recruit was excellent from outside, making 73 three-pointers this season.

Andrew Rohde of Brookfield Central was one of the most improved players in the state this season, and was the driving factor in the Lancers making the Division 1 state title game. He averaged 28.5 points, 8.1 rebounds, and 6.1 assists per game this year, scoring a new state tournament record 55 combined points in two games at the Kohl Center.

Division 2 WBCA All-State

Seniors Marcus Tomashek of Ashwaubenon and Max Weisbrod of DeForest as well as junior Milan Momcilovic of Pewaukee are repeat selections on the Wisconsin Basketball Coaches Association Division 2 boys basketball All-State Team.

Tomashek was a driving force behind Ashwaubenon's run to the Division 2 state tournament and 24-5 overall record. He upped his scoring average to 26.1 points per game as a senior to go with 6.9 rebounds and 2.4 assists per game as the Jaguars had one of the best seasons in school history.

Weisbrod guided DeForest to the Division 1 state tournament last season and a Badger-East conference title as a senior. The 6'4" Northern Michigan recruit averaged 21.1 points per game as a senior, shooting 50% from the field, 80% from the free throw line, and 42% from three-point. He added seven rebounds and seven assists per game as well.

Momcilovic was the leading scorer and rebounder for the Division 2 state champion Pewaukee Pirates, earning Woodland-West Player of the Year. The versatile 6'8" junior averaged 18.1 points and 7.7 rebounds per game as a repeat All-State choice, totaling 37 points and 14 rebounds in two games at state.

Jack Champion of Milton was the consummate floor general for the Red Hawks. The four-year varsity standout averaged 16.8 points, 5.0 rebounds, and 6.7 assists per game in his senior season, finishing his career with more than 1600 points and 500 assists.

Learic Davis of Milwaukee Bradley Tech was one of the most electrifying players in the state, with numerous highlight-reel dunks. He was a very well-rounded player, however, leading the Milwaukee City Conference co-champs in scoring (22.1), rebounding (8.8), and assists (6.2).

Devon Fielding of La Crosse Central was the floor general for a RiverHawks squad that finished as Division 2 runners-up this season. The 6'2" senior averaged a team-best 15.1 points per game as Central went 28-2.

Colin Hardrick of Wauwatosa West has averaged at least 20 points per game each of the past two seasons, pouring in 21.7 per game in his senior campaign. He shot 54.3% from the field, also leading the team with 7.0 rebounds per game for the Trojans.

Ashton Janowski was a leader on two straight Pewaukee state title teams, serving in a high-production role while also a steadying influence. As a senior, he averaged 15.7 points per game while shooting a blistering 50.3% from behind the three-point line.

Danilo Jovanovich of Whitnall was one of the most productive players in the state this year, averaging 28.7 points, 11.8 rebounds, and 4.1 assists per game. It capped off an impressive high school career that saw the 6'8" Miami (FL) recruit average at least 20 points per game each of his last three years, finishing with 1,797 points.

Kon Knueppel of Wisconsin Lutheran was part of a well-balanced Wisconsin Lutheran group that shared the Woodland-West conference title with Pewaukee and finished 25-3 overall against a very challenging schedule.

The 6'5" sophomore led the team in scoring (14.1 points per game) and rebounding (6.5 per game) while also dishing out 2.8 assists per contest.

Xzavion Mitchell of Oshkosh North put together one of the best freshman seasons we've seen in some time, leading the Spartans with 21.8 points and 8.4 rebounds per game while playing in one of the toughest leagues in the state. The 6'6" forward posted five games of at least 30 points in his first varsity season.

Jack Rose of Westosha Central has been a four-year varsity performer for the Falcons, racking up 1,636 points in his career. As a senior, he averaged 20.4 points and 6.5 rebounds per game in helping Westosha Central to the Division 2 state tournament.

Division 3 WBCA All-State

Senior guard Luke Haertle of Lake Country Lutheran has been chosen by the Wisconsin Basketball Coaches Association as a first-team all-state selection among players who compete at the WIAA Division 3 level for the third year in a row.

Haertle, who will attend the University of Wisconsin in the fall and play basketball for the Badgers as a preferred walkon, headlines the list of Division 3 All-State players released today.

A 6-foot-4 guard who scored 2,264 points and grabbed more than 1,000 rebounds during his stellar prep career, Haertle led Lake Country Lutheran to the WIAA State Tournament as a junior and senior, and the Division 3 title this season.

Denmark senior forward Donovan Short (6-10) is a two-time first-team Division 3 selection by the WBCA. The UW-Green Bay recruit led Denmark to an 18-9 record by averaging 23.0 points and 8.6 rebounds.

Ripon junior wing Riley Brooks (6-6) is one of the more prolific scorers in the state and a NCAA Division I prospect. Brooks, who owns scholarship offers from Indiana State and Toledo, averaged 25.8 points, 9.8 rebounds and 2.7 assists.

Senior Gus Foster (6-3) led Big Foot to a sectional final and an 18-11 record by averaging 22.6 points and 10.2 rebounds. He plans to play at NCAA Division III UW-Stevens Point in the fall.

Junior Carson Koepnick (6-1) helped West Salem to the Coulee Conference title and a runner-up finish in the WIAA Division 3 State Tournament by averaging 16.2 points and 3.1 assists on a very balanced and talented team.

Junior forward Jeremy Lorenz (6-8) is one of the state's top class-of-2023 prospects. He led Brillion to a runner-up finish in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference and a spot in the state tournament by averaging 19.8 points, 11.5 rebounds and 3.2 assists. He owns a NCAA Division I scholarship offers from nearby Green Bay and Toledo.

Junior Jordan Malmlov (6-1) led Prescott to the championship in the Middle Border Conference and a 22-3 record by averaging 22.8 points, 3.7 rebounds and 3.9 assists. He has scored 1,262 points in three years of prep basketball.

Like Koepnick, senior Monte Mayberry (6-3) excelled on a very talented team that relied on balance and depth. Mayberry averaged 20.0 points, 6.1 rebounds and 4.8 assists for the Heart O'North Conference champions.

Sophomore Amari McCottry (6-5) of Metro Classic Conference-champion St. Thomas More can put together some incredible stat lines. For example, he had 39 points, 17 rebounds and nine assists in the Cavaliers' sectional-semifinal win over Dominican. He was named Player of the Year in his league and led St. Thomas More to its first WIAA State Tournament appearance.

Sophomore Cody Schmitz (6-4) is an athletic, versatile wing player who put up some crazy scoring stats for the \ Red Hawks. He averaged 30.2 points and 9.9 rebounds and scored a whopping 61 points in a victory over Sparta.

Senior Landon VanCalster (6-7) helped Freedom to a sectional-final appearance and a 23-5 record by averaging 18.1 points, 3.8 rebounds and 3.1 assists. The NCAA Division II recruit for Northern Michigan finished his prep career with more than 1,250 points.

Senior Austin Wagner (6-6) was voted Player of the Year in the East Central Conference. He led Kettle Moraine Lutheran to the league title and a 19-5 record by averaging 18.9 points, 7.5 rebounds and 2.7 assists.

Division 4 WBCA All-State

Senior guards Derek Lindert of Pardeeville and Craig Ward of Marshall have been chosen by the Wisconsin Basketball Coaches Association as first-team all-state selections among players who compete at the WIAA Division 4 level for the second year in a row.

Meanwhile, Sheboygan Lutheran senior guard Casey Verhagen earned the honor for the third year in a row, although the past two seasons came at the Division 5 level.

Lindert is a four-time all-league performer in the Trailways Conference. The 6-foot-2 wing guard averaged 26.1 points, 8.8 rebounds, 4.8 assists and 2.3 steals while helping the Bulldogs to a 16-9 record. Lindert completed his prep career with 2,051 points.

Ward (6-2) earned first-team all-league laurels in the Capitol South Conference as a sophomore, junior and senior. He helped Marshall to a spot in the WIAA Division 4 State Tournament and a 22-7 record by averaging 21.8 points, 4.2 rebounds, 2.8 assists and 2.0 steals. Ward completed his prep career with 1,852 points.

No matter the division, Verhagen (6-1) proved to be an outstanding performer for Sheboygan Lutheran during his high school career. The NCAA Division II recruit for Northern Michigan led the Crusaders to the Big East South Conference title and a 25-2 record by averaging 26.2 points, 4.6 rebounds, 6.0 assists and 2.8 steals. He finished his four-years of high school basketball with 2,265 points.

Barnstable (6-1) was voted Player of the Year in the Big East Conference. After playing junior varsity basketball as a junior due to WIAA rules following a transfer from Sheboygan Lutheran, Barnstable averaged 26.7 points, 7.8 rebounds, 3.4 assists and 2.6 steals. He made 93-of-222 shots from three-point range for 42 percent and helped the Tigers to a 23-5 record and a spot in the Division 4 sectional finals.

Nacir Beamon (6-2) played a major role as a sophomore for a Milwaukee Academy of Science program that finished second in the Division 4 State Tournament. Beamon averaged 15.3 points, 4.5 rebounds and 4.2 assists for the Novas.

Tayshawn Bridges (6-2) is also a sophomore and also a very key contributor to the success at Milwaukee Academy of Science. Considered a potential NCAA Division I recruit, Bridges averaged 18.8 points, 4.6 rebounds, 3.3 assists and 4.5 steals as MAS finished the campaign with a 23-6 record.

Senior Joah Filardo (6-1) of Mineral Point helped the Pointers to a share of the Southwest Wisconsin Activities League championship with Cuba City and a 23-4 record. Filardo averaged a team-high 17.0 points per game and 4.3 rebounds per outing.

Tristan McRoberts (6-6) of Melrose-Mindoro had a senior season to remember while helping his team to a 16-10 record. The versatile backcourt performer averaged 27.4 points, 9.7 rebounds, 5.1 assists and 2.4 steals. He finished his prep career with 1,264 points and scored a career-best 51 points in a victory over Coulee Christian/Providence this winter.

Point guard Carter Olson (5-11) led Cuba City to a very successful season by averaging 18.6 points, 2.8 rebounds and 4.5 assists. The exceptionally quick and aggressive Olson led the SWAL in both scoring and assists while sparking the Cubans to a 24-3 record.

Luke Pautz (6-4) was the catalyst for Roncalli's run to the Division 4 state championship. A four-year varsity player who scored 1,517 career points and went off for 56 in a sectional semifinal win over Saint Mary Catholic, Pautz earned Player of the Year honors in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference as a junior and senior. He averaged 25.8 points, 11.5 rebounds, 3.6 assists and 2.5 steals as a senior while leading Roncalli to a 26-3 record.

Parker Prahll (6-5) did a bit of everything for Iola-Scandinavia while leading the Thunderbirds to a 27-1 record. He averaged 19.1 points, 12.3 rebounds, 3.7 assists and 2.4 steals while also playing strong defense for the Central Wisconsin East Conference champions.

Randolph seniors Travis Alvin and Sam Grieger are repeat selections on the Wisconsin Basketball Coaches Association Division 5 All-State squad.

Fresh from their state-title game victory over Bangor, Alvin and Grieger are the lone repeat honorees on the Division 5 squad.

Alvin, a bruising 6-foot-6 forward headed to the University of Wisconsin to play football, averaged 17.9 points, 10.6 rebounds and 2.5 assists while leading Randolph to a 28-2 record, the Division 5 state crown and the Trailways West Conference title. He scored 1,502 points during his four-year high school career.

Grieger, a skilled 6-foot-5 left-handed guard, set a WIAA Division 5 record with his 41-point outburst against Gibraltar in the state semifinals. The co-Player of the Year in the Trailways West with Pardeeville's Derek Lindert, Grieger averaged 22.2 points, 7.4 rebounds and 5.0 assists, and he finished his four-year prep career with 1,482 points.

2022 Mr. Basketball: Seth Trimble, Menomonee Falls

Menomonee Falls senior guard Seth Trimble has been named the 2022 Mr. Basketball award-winner by the Wisconsin Basketball Coaches Association, sponsored by JustAgame Fieldhouse in Wisconsin Dells.

"It means a lot to me," Trimble said of being chosen for the prestigious award. "It complements all the work I've put in during my four years of high school. Winning this award was one of the goals I had coming into the season."

An athletic, creative and productive 6-foot-3 combination guard, Trimble led Menomonee Falls to the championship in the Greater Metro Conference, considered one of the elite leagues in Wisconsin.

He also helped Menomonee Falls to its first appearance in the WIAA Division 1 State Tournament, scoring 26 points in a sectional-semifinal win over Green Bay East and 19 in the sectional-final triumph over De Pere.

"The big thing with our team this year is the chemistry we've been able to build," Trimble said. "Our chemistry and our experience with 11 seniors on the team has been great. Some of us have been together since third or fourth grade."

Trimble has a very talented supporting cast, but the North Carolina recruit nonetheless put up outstanding numbers.

He averaged 26.8 points, 7.4 rebounds, 4.3 assists, 2.5 steals and 1.6 blocked shots. In the process, he went over 2,000 career points and became Menomonee Falls' all-time leader in scoring and assists.

"We knew we had a good team this year," Trimble said. "We've tried to maintain that killer mentality going into every game."

Trimble may have been at his best in an 83-70 victory over Totino-Grace of the Twin Cities in the annual Wisconsin vs. Minnesota Border Battle held at Minneapolis North High School in January.

In that game, Trimble helped the Phoenix rally from a double-digit second-half deficit by pouring in 35 points and scoring in every way possible while helping his team to an 83-70 triumph over one of Minnesota's best teams.

His performance created plenty of buzz among the large crowd gathered for the contest.

Trimble also scored a season-high 41 points in a league triumph over Wauwatosa West. He shot 57 percent from the field, 78 percent from the foul line and 33 percent from three-point range. Trimble averaged 7.5 free throw attempts per game, among the best in the state.

"I am very grateful to receive this award," he said. "My parents were extremely excited that I was selected for this honor. But when I found out, I was extremely thankful."

Coach Ratka said that she knew watching how Kamy competed and practiced her freshman year that she would get everything out of her ability.

"I have never seen a player so determined and work so hard every single day. She practices like she is trying to make the team, and that never changed as she experienced different levels of success. No one has prepared harder than Kamy Peppler."

Coach Ratka went on to say that Kamy is a program changer. "She is a special kind of superstar that empowers others and shows them the greatness that they have inside of them. It's obvious that she has talent on the court, but what makes her elite is how she treats others. She has a humility that makes her down to earth and approachable to all of her teammates."

Honoring the Game

Like many of the members of the Executive Board of the Wisconsin Basketball Coaches Association I have grown more concerned about the incidents we have witnessed surrounding high school basketball and activities in general. This year the behavior of fans and some players has demonstrated a lack of respect and civility toward opponents and officials. My question is: Should the WBCA step into this area of concern with a clear public statement and provide some resources for schools and coaches in confronting the challenge?

In my opinion our sport (as well as others) is getting caught up in the caustic attitude reflected by our adult citizens regarding how to handle emotional disagreements. The sportsmanship statement read before games seems to be losing impact on our crowds. Historically, as coaches, players and fans we have disagreed with calls or lack of calls but we were able to move forward without creating an incident that became violent or unsafe. If basketball is going to survive as a spectator sport and as an extension of the classroom, we need to address the dysfunctional direction before we have more uncivil situations. In my five decades of coaching, I seldom if ever doubted the positive impact that our sport had on our players. I saw positives within the school and community as a result of the players involvement in basketball. I realize society has been changing, however, the basic positive qualities that athletes get from being involved in athletics provide a foundation for their future success in life. Some of those qualities are being able to handle tough situations, stressful issues, celebrating success in a mature manner and dealing with failure as an opportunity to reflect on what they need to do to improve.

It's a bit uncomfortable to bring politics into our discussion but it has created a climate that seems to support caustic disagreement. Politicians continue to make an attempt to hijack local education in an effort to get talking points for their political futures. I have heard politicians weigh in on athletics and the discussion even goes to the youth sports level. I think it is important for us to make a clear statement about our sport and how it can continue to be mainstay to developing responsible citizens. As coaches we have much on our plate but in unison and cooperation with the entire school community I think we are responsible to make sure our athletes grasp the essence of sportsmanship and respect for our opponents. We understand high level of competition and we know it brings out the best in our athletes and at times the worst. Our guidance in those tough times is important. The problem, of course, is often outside of the teams and outside of our control. Those situations need to be confronted directly by those responsible for game management, but we can all work at making the climate of a game positive. I have included a few ideas and some can be used if appropriate:

1. Prior to game officials and coaches can greet each other in the middle of the gym so fans see the respect individuals have for each other.
2. An athlete from each team together can share a welcome and encouragement for the student fans and adults to support their team and respect the other team.
3. Pre-season parent meeting with athletes and coaches sharing the expectations at events.
4. Booster club member or parent can address crowd when teams go in before game.
5. Principal and respected staff member can share with students in smaller groups or assembly the expectation of respectful behavior at all events.

The members of our Board are successful coaches with a great deal of experience. I am sure they have done things that work. I share these thoughts in hopes of beginning a discussion to address the climate that we are all dealing with.

With a regular strength training program, you can reduce your body fat, increase bone strength, increase your lean muscle mass and burn calories more efficiently. - Consider joining a Yoga Class. Developing a stretching and flexibility program is essential as we get older. The benefits of increased balance, agility, endurance, core strength and flexibility cannot be duplicated in other exercise programs.
