### MR. BASKETBALL - JORDAN McCABE

Jordan McCabe of Kaukauna High School has been named the 2018 recipient of the Mr. Basketball award presented by the Wisconsin Basketball Coaches Association, sponsored by JustAGame Fieldhouse in Wisconsin Dells.

The small but mighty ball-handling whiz from Kaukauna made a name for himself even before entering high school.

Jordan McCabe's incredible ability to maneuver a basketball with his hands gained national notoriety when he was just 12 years old.

Living in the Seattle area at the time, McCabe was featured on a sports segment on KOMO News as word of his superadvanced ball-handling ability began to be noticed. To date, that segment has been viewed by more than 2.3 million on YouTube.

Fast forward several years to McCabe's high school days playing for coach Mike Schalow at Kaukauna High School and the 6-foot-0 point guard's unique ball handling, passing and shooting skills continue to draw massive interest from fans of all ages.

Wherever McCabe plays, the crowds are huge and he most often delivers a memorable play or two while helping his team achieve a victory.

A four-year varsity player for the Ghosts, McCabe led Kaukauna to a state championship as a sophomore and hopes to do the same as a senior.

He has scored a remarkable 2,390 career points heading into the 2018 WIAA State Tournament to rank sixth on the state's all-time scoring list. He also has 681 assists, 478 rebounds and 240 steals during his stellar prep career.

McCabe, who signed a letter of intent to play NCAA Division I basketball for coach Bob Huggins at West Virginia last November, earned first-team All-State honors from the Associated Press as a sophomore and junior, and is likely to make it three in a row when that team is announced later this month.

He is a three-time first-team all-league pick in perhaps the state's toughest conference, the Fox Valley Association. As a senior, he shared the league's Player of the Year honors with Tyrese Haliburton of Oshkosh North.





"The thing that jumps out immediately to me about Jordan is that he is our best player, but he is also our hardest worker," Schalow said. "When your best player is your hardest worker, that is a key component in what kind of effort you get from the other players on your team. Jordan's work ethic sets him apart from others. He is the hardest-working player I have ever coached, both in season and out of season. It's been four years of being extremely fortunate to have a player of Jordan's magnitude in our program."

A social media star thanks to his ability dribble the ball in a manner rarely seen at the high school level, McCabe scored a career-high 46 points in a loss to Kimberly as a junior. As a senior, he is averaging 26.6 points, 6.0 rebounds, 7.8 assists and 2.4 steals while shooting 39 percent from the field, 82 percent from the foul line (152 of 186) and 34 percent from three-point range (103 of 303).

Kaukauna took a 23-3 mark into the WIAA State Tournament and the No. 1 seed among the four teams in the Division 2 field.

Though Marquette and Wisconsin showed some interest in McCabe, he opted to commit to West Virginia prior to the start of his junior season. Schalow, for one, thinks McCabe will be a very good player at college basketball's highest level.

"Jordan has done a lot of things to prove people wrong," Schalow said. "And I go back to his work ethic. He's extremely confident in his ability because he works so hard on his skill set. He has also proven himself on the AAU circuit at the highest end, and those are the players he is going to go up against at the next level.

"He also has a coaching staff at West Virginia that believes in him and has watched him from his early days in high school."

### **MISS BASKETBALL - HAILEY OSKEY**

Hailey Oskey of Seymour High School has been named the 2018 Miss Basketball award-winner by the Wisconsin Basketball Coaches Association, sponsored by JustAgame Fieldhouse in Wisconsin Dells.

"I was surprised when I received the news. I knew there were a lot of other really good basketball players in the mix to receive the honor," Oskey said.

Oskey is an outstanding athlete who affects the game on both ends of the floor. She excels on dribble penetration and has worked hard to became an all-around player, which includes becoming a better shooter.

The 5-foot-10 wing averaged 18.6 points, 6 rebounds, 3 assists and 3 steals per game for the Thunder, who went unbeaten in the Bay Conference and finished 23-2 overall. After helping Seymour to the Division 2 sectional finals as a junior, the Thunder advanced to the sectional semi-finals this season.

Oskey said she didn't think about the potential of being named Miss Basketball until late in the season.

"Didn't surprise me she was named Miss Basketball. All of her stats were up and she worked really hard to make herself an allaround player," Seymour coach Bobby Kuchta said.

Coach Kuchta went on to say that she has set the bar high for the Seymour program. "She's a great role model and very coachable player."

Oskey ended her career as Seymour's all-time leading scorer with 1,571 points, leading the team to 75 wins in her four years on varsity. Oskey will continue her basketball career with the Green Bay Phoenix.

Lutheran), Todd Jahns (Kettle Moraine Lutheran), Storm Harmon (Menomonie), Dave Boland (Seneca), Todd Hansen (Pewaukee), Judy Harms (Whitewater), Nicole Sutter, Coaches Association President (Oshkosh West) and Jerry Petitigoue (WBCA Executive Director). Deb Hauser and Kate Peterson Abiad attended the meeting representing the WIAA.

Judy Harms was presented a certificate in appreciation for her three years of service on the committee.

### I. 2017 MEETING MINUTES

A. Deb Hauser provided the committee members with a review of the WIAA committee flowchart prior to the start of the day's discussions. <u>Motion by Todd Jahns, seconded by</u> <u>Judy Harms, to approve the minutes of the 2017 meeting</u>. Passed unanimously.

### II. SEASON REGULATIONS

A. Review of WIAA Season Regulations.

B. Brian Winchester started a conversation about utilizing current high school players as clinicians for youth camps and clinics. Younger kids look up to the high school players and it would be nice to have them involved in the camps and clinics. Motion by Brian Winchester, seconded by Nicki Sutter for <u>Varsity coaches be allowed to use their players as clinicians for youth (K-8) camps and clinics, with school approval.</u> Motion passed unanimously

C. Open Gyms: Jerry Petitigoue discussed the rule that states 8<sup>th</sup> graders by not be involved in an open gym with high school players. He believes this penalizes small schools who only have one gym and court time is difficult to get. (Brian Winchester). Second (Dave Boland) <u>For School sponsored open gyms are open to all grade levels.</u> Motion passed <u>unanimously.</u>

D. Maximum Allowed Games: WBCA has offered a new proposal for basketball scheduling rules (see attachment). The WBCA was unanimous in their approval of this

proposal. Much discussion. Wording should be changed to MULTI-GAME instead of MULTI-SCHOOL. Tournaments should involve no loss of school time. One rationale is that VB and Wrestling already have this option. It also alleviates the search for more game dates and gives coaches flexibility in scheduling. Some schools from big conferences have 18 conference games and are only allowed have 4 non-conference. This would allow them to play more non-conference competitions. (Niki Sutter). Second (Todd Hansen) <u>Varsity</u> teams be allowed to schedule either 22 games, or 21 games and 1 [tournament or multi-game] event. Tournament / Multi-game parameters include (a) must involve no loss of school time, and (b) school is limited to no more than 2 games in one day, and (c) school is limited to no more than 3 games overall. Non-varsity teams are still subject to the 22 game limit. Motion passed 8-1 (Opposed – Judy Harms)

E. Rules Governing Competition: Conversation about the following items;

Mercy Rule - worked well. No complaints

<u>28 ft coaching box</u> – didn't hear anything negative. Liked this addition.

<u>18 min halves</u> (varsity) – some felt they had to play more kids, some didn't. Different strategy halves vs. quarters. Halves seemed to make the games go faster. Varsity games started earlier. Happy with this.

<u>Shot Clock</u> – What happened?? Deb offered that the schools were concerned with cost and execution/training of shot clock operators. Comments were made regarding whether or not there was enough discussion between coaches and their AD's. There was a feeling that the AD's got cut out of the process. Existence of a website that campaigned against the implementation of the shot clock. The NFHS, head of the basketball committee has indicated to Deb that there is talk about adopting the shot clock at the national level. This will create a domino effect. Illinois is going to a shot clock next year. Wisconsin schools play Illinois schools a lot. Coaches feel that this is good for the kids, they are excited about the possibility of using shot clocks – but the adults don't want to do it. Should this be only Division 1/2/3 to take the burden off the small schools who don't have the money? At this time there are some entire conferences who have shot clock capabilities in their gyms. (Big River Conference) (Niki Suter). Second (Brian Winchester) Experimental Year (2019-2020) for shot clocks. Parameters are (a) both coaches must agree, (b) varsity only, (c) non-conference games and tournaments.

More discussion on shot clocks and how to move this forward in Wisconsin. Could implement it at the State Tournament level and see if this jump starts the most competitive teams in each Division.

(Brian Winchester). Second (Storm Harmon) <u>Utilize Shot Clocks (35 seconds) in the 2020</u> <u>WIAA State Tournament games in all Divisions for Boys and Girls. Vote 8-1 (Chad</u> <u>Weinfurter Opposed)</u>

<u>Uniforms</u> – Wearing dark at home and white (light) away. Football does this. Not much discussion. More concerned about the use of Grays and Golds for dark uniforms. Deb

would like this to be discouraged. Nicole brought up the ability to see numbers on the jersey. Some teams' numbers are not easily visible..

### III. TOURNAMENT PROCEDURES

A. Review of WIAA Tournament Procedures

B. Rules Governing Competition: <u>Charge/Block Arc</u> – Spent time discussing if this make it easier for officials to make the proper call. Deb suggested that we wait until the NFHS implements the arc.

Eliminating Jump Ball – brief discussion. No approval.

Advancing the Ball – Deb suggested that we wait until the NFHS implements this rule.

<u>Clock Stoppage in last minute on made baskets</u> – Coaches would like to see this for varsity games.

### (Brian Winchester). Second (Judy Harms) <u>Clock will stop on a made basket in the</u> <u>final minute of regulation play in Varsity games. Vote 7-2. (Todd Jahns, Dave Boland</u> <u>Opposed)</u>

C. Assignment of Schools <u>Tournament Division Procedure</u> – Kate brought questions regarding the divisions of boys and girls basketball teams. First, it is necessary to add language to the tournament regulations that tells us how to divide the remaining teams in Divisions 3 and 4. Other WIAA sports have language that states "If there are an uneven number of schools for Division 3 and 4, Division \_\_\_\_\_ will include one more school than Division \_\_\_\_\_." There is currently no language that guides this procedure in Basketball. Deb informed the group that the extra team always goes down to the smaller Division.

### (Judy Harms). Second (David Boland). <u>Add language to current Tournament Procedure to</u> <u>read "If there are an uneven number of school for Division 3 and 4, Division 4 will</u> <u>include one more school than Division 3. Vote: Unanimous</u>

Second, the current regulations are written that the schools will be divided for boys and girls independently of one another, following the procedure outlined in 1(a-h). When this is done, there are some schools (7 in 2018-19) that would be competing in a different division in boys basketball than they are competing in girls basketball. The standard procedure, going back as long as Deb can remember, is that we match the two programs in the same division (the higher division) so that the schools are competing in the same division during the same season. Deb relayed the information that this is done in all sports that compete in the same season (Track and Field, Cross Country and Basketball) but not in sports that compete in different seasons (Soccer, Swimming, Golf...). Track and Field and Cross Country often

consider their boys and girls teams as one program and are many times coached by the same individual(s).

If we are going to continue to match the boys and girls teams into the same division which is not currently supported in writing in the Tournament Regulations, then we should develop language to add to the current document.

If we are going to divide the teams, independent of each other, as outlined in the Tournament Regulations, we will have a few schools each year who are competing in different divisions in boys and girls basketball.

Committee was unaware of how the divisions are created and felt that most coaches are not aware of the discrepancy.

Deb suggested that there would be more pushback if we decided to separate the boys and girls at the same school into different divisions. Coaches on the committee felt that we just keep doing it the same way and add language to the Tournament Regulations that will reflect the procedure.

It was decided that Kate will develop the language and send it to the Committee members For review. No vote was taken. Kate will talk with Dave Anderson regarding the divisional placement.

The Tournament Plan – Follow-up on proposal from last year regarding playing Regionals on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday and playing Sectionals on Wednesday and Friday. committee members still advocate for this. Not enough prep time for Regional Final. Jerry finds this to be really unfair to boys basketball coaches. Deb shared that the Wednesday Date will not be supported because it is considered church night. It was mentioned that golf Teams play on Wednesdays and that this hasn't been a problem. Todd Hansen remarked That basketball is only asking to play on 1 Wednesday in an 18 week period.

### Motion (Todd Hansen). Second (Chad Weinfurter) <u>Recommend a change to the</u> order of games in the WIAA tournament series. <u>Regionals – Tuesday, Thursday</u> and Saturday. Sectionals – Wednesday and Friday of following week. In years of Ash Wednesday falling on Wednesday, games would be moved to Tuesday / Friday. Vote 7-2 (Judy Harms, Nicole Natzke Opposed)

Seeding Procedures - Computer based formula to handle seeding – Proposed by the WIAA Sports Advisory Committee. Jerry was in favor of this a year ago but is opposed to it now. Discussion about Strength of Schedule and how this is not being reflected in the current seeding meetings but it would be in the computer based system. Nicole felt that playing against higher divisions should be considered. There is a concern that higher division teams won't play lower division teams because of loss of points in the strength of schedule prong. Deb inquired about who would create / run the computer program?

Concerns about the current seeding procedures are:

- o Coaches enter the meeting with pre-filled ranking sheets
- o Coaches are not objective, and are considering favorable layouts for their team

- o Coaches who did not attend the seeding meeting had no consequences
- Deb stated that the WIAA was not notified of this violation. It was suggested that the meeting hosts should handle the concerns that we mentioned, however they are acting purely as a facilitator and not doing an accountability check. Deb informed that the hosts are hard to find.

Suggestions moving forward: Provide incentives to host a seeding meeting, Coaches shouldn't be voting on potential matchups (Integrity and honesty issues are challenging), Possibility of seeding the top 8 teams only and handle the rest geographically (Deb), Initiate conversation with the WBCA and come up with a proposal to be discussed at next Coaches Advisory Meeting

State Tournament seeding meeting Deb did via Zoom Meeting. Jerry thought it went well. Todd felt that the procedure was good but that the results seemed to be based on record only. Todd suggested that an independent person should make the final decision on State Tournament Seeding. Final decision to keep seeding procedure the same at this point. Short discussion on seeding the entire sectional in all divisions (Currently only happens in Division 1)

### (Todd Hansen). Second (Chad Weinfurter) <u>Seed the entire Sectional in Division 2</u> Voting: Unanimous

### (Todd Jahns). Second (Todd Hansen) <u>Seed the entire Sectional in Division 3</u> Voting: Unanimous

### (Chad Weinfurter). Second (Nicole Natzke) <u>Seed the entire Sectional in Division 4</u> <u>Voting: Unanimous</u>

Addressed a concern from a HS coach regarding limiting the number of people who are allowed at a seeding meeting.

### (Nicole Natzke). Second (Judy Harms) <u>Each school is allowed no more than 2</u> representatives at the seeding meetings. Voting: Unanimous

Enrollment Breaks - Discussion included the following ideas a return to 200 or less for Division 5, go to 3 Divisions and bring 8 teams from each division to the State Tournament, go to 4 Divisions and bring 8 Division 1 teams and 4 Division 2, 3, and 4 teams to the State Tournament, divide equally into 5 divisions. Deb suggested that the coaches assemble coaches from the WBCA, representing each Division and discuss what could be done. She mentioned that it is necessary for the State Tournament to fit into a 3 day window. Todd Jahns inquired why we would have 8 Division 1 teams at the State Tournament when they have the smallest amount of total teams in their division.

Deb mentioned that the quality of games has improved since holding only 2 games in each division, and also confirmed that there would be room for one more session on Thursday morning. This could give Division 1 two more teams (to total 6) and seeds 1 and 2 could get A bye in the first round.

State Tournament Review: Tickets – Todd Jahns shared that they did not get their State Tournament tickets until Tuesday at 5pm. It would have been helpful to receive the tickets at least before school let out for the day.

Venues – It would be excellent for player experience if the Sectional Finals could be held at college venues. Deb responded that this is not cost effective for the WIAA. College venues have charged the WIAA for many things (chair set up, etc) that have made this option prohibitive. Jerry suggested that perhaps a letter from Dave Anderson indicating how positive this could be for high school basketball players in Wisconsin and how it could help them with their recruiting would gain better results. Deb suggested that they incorporate this into conversation at the WBCA meetings

3 Point Challenge – Deb inquired if it would be unreasonable to set a stat deadline for the 3 Point Challenge contenders. She would like to see 12:00 noon on Monday following their last regular season game. Judy mentioned that the coaches who wait to input their entire season's stats until the end of the year would not like this deadline. Deb mentioned that there were players who were on the "Leaderboard" over the last few weeks who got bumped off when coaches put in their entire year's stats. Currently the leaderboard is not a true reflection of the top 3 Point shooters. Kate suggested that we have checkpoints throughout the season and to be considered for the finals coaches must have entered the stats in all 3 of the checkpoints. E-mails could be generated by the WIAA office as a reminder for each checkpoint.

### Motion (Niki Sutter). Second (Judy Harms) In order to have a player in consideration for the WIAA 3 Point Challenge, coaches must enter stats in each of 3 dates. Those dates are December 20, January 20, and February 20. Vote: Unanimous

Officiating Rankings – Todd Hanson would like to see a change to officiating rankings. He and others would like to only be required to give comments on rankings of 1 and 2. Currently they are required to give justification for a ranking of 3. Many coaches just give a 4 because they don't want to fill out the comment portion. Joan Gralla – Officials Advisory Committee

### WBCA ANNOUNCES DIVISION 1 BOYS BASKETBALL ALL-STATE TEAM

Seniors Patrick Cartier of Brookfield East, Tyrese Haliburton of Oshkosh North, Mitch Listau of Waunakee, and Marlon Ruffin of Sun Prairie, along with sophomore Jalen Johnson of Sun Prairie were unanimous picks for the Wisconsin Basketball Coaches Association Division 1 All-State Team for the 2017-2018 season. Haliburton and Stevens Point senior Drew Blair are repeat choices, while Listau was a First Team choice in Division 2 last season.

Cartier had a breakout senior season for the Spartans, who were one of the most improved clubs in the state. The 6-7 forward averaged 22.1 points and 6.9 rebounds in helping Brookfield East to a Division 1 runner-up finish. He will play at Division 2 Hillsdale.

Haliburton, an Iowa State recruit, led Oshkosh North to its firstever state championship, scoring 30 points in the title game win over Brookfield East. The FVA Co-Player of the Year as a senior after winning the award by himself as a junior, Haliburton is a repeat All-State choice after averaging 22.9 points, 5.1 rebounds, and 6.2 assists this season.

Listau earns Division 1 All-State after receiving Division 2 All-State laurels last season for the Warriors. A four-year varsity standout, the Belmont recruit is a two-time Player fo the Year in the Badger-North that scored 1,829 career points, twice helping the Warriors to the state tournament.

Ruffin was named the Player of the Year in the Big Eight Conference after helping the Cardinals to an outright league title and trip to the state semi-finals. The senior point guard averaged 18.6 points and 4.1 rebounds for head coach Jeff Boos. He was an Honorable Mention All-State choice last year.

Johnson is one of the elite players in the country in the sophomore class and has scholarship offers from a Who's Who of college programs. The still-developing 6-8 wing player led Sun Prairie with 18.6 points and 9.9 rebounds per game, as the team won the Big Eight title and advanced to state.

Franklin senior Max Alba is one of the best three-sport athletes in the state, earning First Team All-State in football and committing to North Carolina for baseball. He's outstanding on the hardwood as well, helping the Sabers to a Southeast Conference title, averaging 21.1 points and 7 rebounds per contest.

Oshkosh North senior Quincy Anderson really came on in his final season, helping the Spartans to the Division 1 state championship. The 6'4" lefty averaged 17.6 points, 5.8 rebounds, and 2.4 steals per game for head coach Brad Weber.

Stevens Point senior Drew Blair did everything he could to keep the Panthers' three-year state title run alive, but the team would fall in a sectional final to eventual champion Oshkosh North. Blair finished among state leaders with 28.9 points per game, as he shot 57% from the field and 87% from the free throw line. The Northwest Missouri State recruit would add 6.4 rebounds and 3.6 assists per game as well, both team bests.

Milwaukee Riverside senior Carlos Curtis earned First Team All-Conference in the Milwaukee City Conference for the second straight season, leading the Tigers with 21.6 points per game. Committed to East Tennessee State, the 6'3" guard was a dynamic offensive weapon for Riverside throughout his standout career.

Madison East senior Keshawn Justice led the Purgolders in every major statistical category this season, pouring in 20.2 points per game with 10.5 rebounds, and 3.3 assists as well. A two-time First Team All-Conference choice in the Big Eight, the Santa Clara signee finished with 1,514 career points.

### WBCA ANNOUNCES DIVISION 2 BOYS BASKETBALL ALL-STATE TEAM

Seniors Grant Basile of Pewaukee, John Diener of Cedarburg, Tyler Herro of Whitnall, and Jordan McCabe of Kaukauna were unanimous First Team selections on the Wisconsin Basketball Coaches Association All-State Team for the 2017-18 season. Diener, Herro, McCabe, and Milwaukee Washington junior Deontay Long are repeat choices.

Basile is a 6'9" Wright State recruit that helped the Pirates to a Woodland-West Conference title, earning First Team allleague laurels for the second straight year under his head coach and father, Mike Basile. The big man poured in 24.9 points per game and was a monster on the boards as well.

Diener played for his father as well, averaging 23.2 points per game for his dad, Tom. He averaged more than 20 every season of his four-year varsity career, finishing with 2,250 points. A repeat WBCA All-State choice, the DePaul recruit was the North Shore Conference Player of the Year the past two seasons.

Herro is one of the most dynamic scorers the state has seen, averaging 32.9 per game this season and finishing his career with 2,036 points, despite missing significant time to injury his junior campaign. The Kentucky recruit was on the WBCA All-State Team last season and thrice named the Woodland-East Player of the Year.

McCabe took home prestigious Mr. Basketball honors from the Wisconsin Basketball Coaches Association last week, and capped his career with a dazzling final minute in the D2 championship game, where the Ghosts won a second state title in the last three years. His 2,442 career points place him sixth on the state's all-time list.

Johnny Davis of La Crosse Central is just a sophomore, but after serving as a contributor on last season's state title team, he took on a much bigger role this season, scoring 22.8 points per game with 7.3 rebounds as the Red Raiders advanced back to the state tournament. The 6'5" guard has a number of scholarship offers, including from Wisconsin.

Milwaukee Washington freshman Michael Foster has already committed to Arizona State and is ranked among the best Class of 2021 players in the country. He showed why all season, averaging 18.4 points and 10 rebounds per game. The 6-9 forward scored 39 points and grabbed 15 rebounds in two state tournament games.

Jaxon Knotek of River Falls was named the Player of the Year in the Big Rivers Conference for a second straight season. The 6'6" senior led the league at 20.4 points per game as a senior. He will play his college basketball at North Dakota State.

Deontay Long of Milwaukee Washington averaged 28.4 points and 8.1 rebounds per game for Milwaukee Washington this season. A repeat All-State choice and Co-Player of the Year in the Milwaukee City Conference, he helped the Purgolders back to the state tournament, where they finished second. Slinger senior Derek Sabin posted an impressive final campaign for the Owls, averaging a team-best 19.7 points per game, as the team finished 13-11 overall. The 6'8" forward improved his scoring average each season as a four-year varsity player at Slinger.

Jake Schroeckenthaler of Monona Grove was one of the best pure post players in the state this season. The 6'7" senior averaged 19.7 points per game as the Badger-South Player of the Year, guiding the Silver Eagles to an outright league championship and 24-2 overall record.

Westosha Central's Jaeden Zackery was a key part of a young Falcons' team that turned it on the postseason and advanced to the Division 2 state tournament. The 6'1" guard averaged 16.5 points per game to go with 4.7 rebounds and 4 assists per game as a First Team All-Conference selection.

As we move forward in the world of officiating, it is common knowledge that both physical and mental health are requirements for successful seasons and long careers. The stress of officiating dozens of games each year, and balancing that schedule with both work and family can be overwhelming. On court performance can be affected by these multiple factors.

The off season is a good time to take an inventory of your overall health, your sleeping patterns and your nutrition. Some suggestions may include:

- Aerobic training, also called cardio, improves the ability to use oxygen to sustain your ability to run the floor for long periods
  of time. Officiating requires repeated bursts of high intensity activity that draw on quick energy sources. Sustained workouts
  improve your bodies ability to breath in and use oxygen thereby making the heart more efficient. Running, speed walking,
  stair climbing or swimming are recommended activities.
- Strength training can help you tone your muscles and improve your appearance. With a regular strength training program, you can reduce your body fat, increase bone strength, increase your lean muscle mass and burn calories more efficiently. It doesn't take that long to see noticeable improvements in your strength and stamina over time.
- Developing a stretching and flexibility program is essential as we get older. I have found the answer through my yoga class. It's hard to reap the benefits of increased balance, agility, endurance, core strength and flexibility in other exercise programs. Most importantly, yoga changes the way you think and approach almost everything in life. When you learn to move with ease and stop forcing things, you prevent injuries and your body will open your mind increasing your flexibility all around.
- We all need to improve our nutritional habits. What you eat has a huge effect on how your live and how your perform. Think
  of yourself as a high performing athlete that needs to be at peak performance each time you step onto the court to officiate
  a game. Achieving that goal includes a diet with plenty of fruits and vegetables, whole grain carbohydrates, and healthy
  sources of protein such as chicken, fish, eggs, nuts and legumes. Evaluate your alcohol consumption with an eye toward
  increasing your hydration with good old H20.
