Please be prepared to remove cell phones, cameras, and keys from your pockets as you pass through the detectors. You may NOT bring in a gun, Swiss Army knife, pocket knife, or leatherman knife.

Please allow yourself extra time upon arrival at the Kohl Center as long lines may exist. All games will start at their scheduled time. Doors will open 1 1/2 hours prior to Session 1 on Thursday and 1 hour prior to all games for the remainder of the tournament.

# **WORKING WITH THE TABLE CREW**

We have all been in situations where the table crew may be inexperienced. As a result, problems occur during the game and officials are caught in an uncomfortable position. This occurs at nearly every level of play.

It may be a last second shot when time has run out but the horn failed to sound. Or, communication is lacking with the scorer and fouls are recorded before you even report the foul. Or the shot clock operator was pulled from the stands as the result of someone not showing up. I have seen it all throughout my forty plus years of officiating.

Regardless of the experience level of the table crew, officials are responsible for their mistakes. Our goal is to minimize the impact the table crew can have on the game by having both table management and clock awareness. We can do this in the following ways.....

### **PREPARATION**

- Assume that your table crew will have a level of inexperience
- Assume that your table crew may make a mistake
- Assume that someone in your crew may miss the mistake

By assuming that these things may occur, you can be at your very best in the event that a problem develops. Be aware of rules pertaining to correctable errors, foul administration, scoring and timing regulations, live and dead ball situations, time outs, technical fouls and alternating possessions. In addition, report to the table 10 minutes before the game to avoid having to start the game with a technical foul due to a lack of game preparation.

### **INFORMATION**

Keep in mind that the information that you provide to the table will need to be tailored to the level of basketball that you are officiating. At all levels, you need to remind the table that they are a part of your team.

Politely introduce yourself to all table personnel and ask if they have any questions that you can answer.

When discussing game procedures, be sure that your comments are not condescending. If you are working with a veteran table crew, ask them how you can assist them in certain situations.

### COMMUNICATION

As you have heard numerous times, communication is essential in establishing good table management and clock awareness skills. That communication begins in your pre-game conference where you discuss last second shot responsibility, eye contact, free throw confirmation, fouls/bonus, timeouts, warnings, technical fouls, throw-ins, team control, substitutes, correctable errors and the alternating possession arrow.

By following these suggestions, you will experience a level of comfort that may ensure that your game will go well. And, it just may carry you to the next level of officiating.

## WBCA ONLINE ALL-STAR NOMINATION PROCESS

The online nomination form is online and can be found on the home page of WisBCA.org as well as by clicking on the "Nomination Forms" link under the "About".

Nominating your student-athlete online is the only way for them to be considered for participation in the games.

### ONLY A VARSITY HEAD COACH WHO IS A WBCA MEMBER CAN NOMINATE A PLAYER.

Once again, stats will no longer be included on the form but will be pulled from the WisSports-net database after the regular season is concluded. If you need access to your team to update your all-star nominee's stats you can contact WSN at info@ wissports.net.

Only students who are scheduled to graduate in the current spring (2017) are eligible to be nominated. We may request confirmation from the principal and guidance counselor that the student has passed all necessary requirements and will graduate. If the student fails to graduate, he or she will NOT be allowed to play in the WBCA All-Star game.

Students who have committed major athletic code violations during their senior year are not allowed to be nominated for the game. Furthermore, if a violation occurs after they have been selected from the team they will be replaced. These major athletic code violations would include any suspension for alcohol or drugs related activity and if the student-athlete participates in a violation of citizenship, which includes violating any criminal law or local ordinance. If a coach feels like their student-athlete's violation was not justified they may appeal to the all-star committee before the all-star selection meeting takes place.

The dates of the girls game is June 15th and the boys game will be on June 16th. IF YOUR STUDENT-ATHLETE WILL NOT BE ABLE TO PARTICIPATE IN THE GAMES PLEASE DO NOT NOMINATE THEM. We only announce confirmed participants so it is to no benefit for your player to be nominated if they can not attend due to injury, college commitment or any other reason.

Lastly, each participant in the games is required to raise a minimum of \$500 as part of our fundraising efforts for the MACC Fund to help fight childhood cancer and blood related diseases. The WBCA covers lodging, meals and gear for all players selected to the game so there are no expenses required beyond raising the money for charity. As the nominated varsity coach, you are guaranteeing that they will raise this money and that you will be held responsible, along with your player for their fundraising efforts. DO NOT NOMINATE YOUR STUDENT ATHLETE IF TOGETHER YOU ARE NOT WILLING TO FUNDRAISE FOR THE GAME.

You will receive an email confirmation/receipt after your nomination is submitted. If you do not get this email, that means you did not complete the process.

Varsity Coaches who are current WBCA members will be invited to attend the selection meeting to speak on their player's behalf.

This year the boy's All-Star selection meeting will take place the Sunday after Sectional finals, March 11 in Wisconsin Dells. The girls will remain on the Saturday of the state tournament in Green Bay. Both locations are to be determined but if you nominate a player you will receive an email with location details.

The deadline for all-star nominations will be March 1st.

# SHOT CLOCK IN HIGH SCHOOL BASKETBALL – THE DEBATE CONTINUES

As high school basketball competition begins to wind toward state tournaments across the country, these events in most states are contested without the use of a shot clock.

For a number of years, proposals to implement a shot clock have been defeated by the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) Basketball Rules Committee. With about 18,000 high schools offering girls and boys programs, the arguments against the use of a shot clock have prevailed.

Interest in the shot clock, however, has led eight state associations to permit its use. Currently, Massachusetts, Maryland, Rhode Island, Washington, New York, California, North Dakota and South Dakota utilize the shot clock for either boys or girls or both. Since there currently is no allowance for a shot clock under NFHS rules, these states forfeit opportunity for service on the Basketball Rules Committee.

A few other states have indicated an interest in the shot clock if NFHS rules permit its use, but many states believe the game should remain different from the college and professional levels.

Kentucky High School Athletic Association (KHSAA) Commissioner Julian Tackett has multiple reasons why his membership doesn't adopt the shot clock, including the lack of a national rule and the fact that the KHSAA is a membershipdriven organization and it hasn't heard a strong outcry from schools wanting to change.

There are also financial, personnel and philosophical questions that are legitimate front-burner issues. Unless the NFHS makes a national rules change, Kentucky likely won't see a state adoption unless its membership proclaims a need.

Theresia Wynns, director of sports and officials education at the NFHS, said there have been a couple of proposals during her three years as staff liaison to the Basketball Rules Committee. Since the NFHS Basketball Rules Book addresses both boys and girls basketball, the proposals have been inclusive of both genders.

The arguments against the rule, Wynns said, include:

- · The high school game does not need the shot clock. It is in good shape as it is.
- A shot clock takes away strategy from some coaches to slow the ball down to match up to the opponent.
- Some committee members are opposed to "state adoption" because everyone should be playing the same game.
- · Education-based basketball does not warrant that studentathletes and coaches play to entertain the public.



"It is difficult to forecast what a committee might do," Wynns said. "We have individuals each year who speak eloquently about the use of the shot clock. They have not be able to convince a majority of the committee to vote positively for the shot clock."

Several states use the shot clock for various reasons and have highly attended state tournaments because of that element of the game, Wynns said.

Washington was among the most recent to make the change as it installed a 35-second shot clock in the spring of 2009 in boys basketball. The 2009-10 school year was the first season of implementation.

"The game itself is essentially the same, with or without a shot clock," said Cindy Adsit, Washington Interscholastic Activities Association assistant executive director. "The shot clock eliminates the possibility of a team running a spread offense, also known as stalling."

Adsit said that a 30-second shot clock has always been in effect for girls in her state. Washington schools adopted NFHS basketball rules for girls in the early 1980s, but it continued to use the shot clock based upon prior arrangements.

St. Bernard (Ohio) Roger Bacon boys basketball coach Brian Neal coaches in a state where the shot clock isn't used but said he would be "shocked if I didn't see it eventually."

He realizes the administrative challenges associated with finding a good clock operator, being able to reset the shot clock in an effective manner and the cost of installation in most school districts would be an uphill climb.

Still, as a coach, Neal is in favor of the shot clock and says it would encourage more teams to play with pace.

## SHOT CLOCK IN HIGH SCHOOL BASKETBALL CONTINUED

"We actually have played in a holiday tournament in New York where a shot clock was used," Neal said. "The week before we really tried to make sure we were prepared for their 35-second shot clock. Once there, we realized that it hardly ever came into play."

Liberty Township (Ohio) Lakota East girls basketball coach Jill Phillips said money is probably one of the biggest reasons the shot clock has not been implemented in more schools.

"It does take away the 'stall' game if a team feels it is at a huge disadvantage to another team," Phillips said. "But in a lot of ways, it creates a more even playing field. Teams can play whatever defense they choose to play versus getting behind and being forced to play man to man because the other team can hold the ball. It completely changes close games at the end of games."

Coaches may enjoy the opportunity but administrators are hesitant to create another possible challenge to a high school gym.

Shot clocks range from \$2,000 for a basic model mounted to the backboards to \$5,000 for one attached to the scoreboards, according to a Columbus Dispatch report in August 2013.

Adsit believes the shot clock will never be accepted by a majority of the NFHS member states for a variety of reasons, but the primary one being finances.

Ohio High School Athletic Association Assistant Commissioner Jerry Snodgrass echoed the challenges Tackett faces in the bordering state.

"I would be honest with you," Snodgrass said. "I wouldn't mind seeing (the shot clock). But, I think wanting it and administrating it are two different things."

The cost factor in Kentucky cannot be underestimated, Tackett said.

"In recently constructed gyms, it might be easy to retrofit and add clocks," Tackett said. "However, in the vast majority of our schools, the facilities are old enough to where adding properly placed clocks would be a very costly addition."

Wynns said the game means something different for the players at the high school, collegiate and professional levels.

"The high school, professional and college basketball games are different because of the parties involved in playing the game," Wynns said.

"It is a business for the professional level. You may or may not see them playing hard. The collegiate player is playing because he/she is being 'paid' to do so through a scholarship. The high school player plays because he/she has the skills that allows them to represent his/her school and to enjoy the camaraderie with the teammates."

Tackett said the scorer's table staffing would also be a significant factor in discussing the shot clock.

"While some of our schools have outstanding individuals with great capabilities that man the required positions of scorer and timer, the prospect of finding an additional qualified individual would be very difficult for the vast majority of the member schools, especially at the non-varsity level," Tackett said. "We use our playing rules at all playing levels (freshmen, junior varsity and varsity), and the table personnel issue is very real."

West Chester (Ohio) Lakota West girls basketball coach Andy Fishman said 70 percent of OHSAA girls basketball players don't play in college. He believes there would be more lopsided scores if the shot clock was installed as teams with less scoring prowess couldn't hold the ball as long.

Fishman likes the shot clock concept, but said he also appreciates the logistical and financial implications.

"Using a shot clock with a 30-point mercy rule might help, but what about the girls who are paying high fees to play? It is inherently wrong to speed up the game," Fishman said.

Tackett said the philosophical statements made by coaches in Kentucky should be duly noted.

"Many lament the current state of the college game, its lack of fundamentals and hurried play," Tackett said. "There is a widely held school of thought that the push to play within the shot clock has contributed to the erosion of fundamental play."

# SOME COACHES STILL STALLING AS SHOT CLOCK GAINS FAVOR

Time might be running out on the stall in high school basketball.

While a proposal for a national shot clock was voted down this year by the National Federation of State High School associations, eight states have adopted a shot clock, though doing so puts those state associations out of compliance with NFHS rules and denies those associations a vote on the NFHS basketball rules committee.

"It seems the interest (in a shot clock) is increasing as opposed to waning," said Mary Struckhoff, an NFHS assistant director and liaison to the NFHS basketball rules committee. "The biggest concern from the committee in voting against a shot clock is the economic climate. If you think all the things that were talked about in the past, such as coaching strategies and pace of play, I feel like the group and some of its constituents are overcoming those concerns."

North Dakota, which had a shot clock for Class A-added it for smaller-enrollment Class B this season. Sherm Sylling, executive secretary of the North Dakota High School Activities Association said a school's cost of adding shot clocks begins at \$2,200 for clocks, plus extra pay of a clock operator.

Bentonville, Ark., boys basketball coach Jason McMahan wasn't thrilled with the stalling by Tahlequah, Okla., this season in a 29-25 Bentonville win, but he sees the other side.

"Under the way things are currently structured, with the pressures high school coaches are under, they have no choice sometimes to resort to those low-scoring games to try to win," McMahan said. "What all of us would want is something that takes the decision out of our hands and puts it into the kids' hands and requires them to make plays."

The crucial moment in Hoosiers happens when Jimmy Chitwood holds the ball for what seems like an eternity before scoring the winning basket. The movie is based loosely on the story of tiny Milan defeating Muncie Central 32-30 for the all-class Indiana state title in 1954. Not surprisingly, Bobby Plump, the real-life Chitwood, is against a high school shot clock. "At the level of high school, you don't get the chance to recruit to your system, as you do in colleges or the pros," Plump said. "You have to coach to the talent you're dealt."

Plump said Milan used its cat-and-mouse offense six times that season, culminating in his winning jump shot against Muncie Central that came after he held the ball 4 minutes. 17 seconds.

Oak Hill (Mouth of Wilson, Va.) coach Steve Smith, who has sent more than 20 players to the NBA, concedes that stall ball doesn't have to be boring – to a point. "I saw a (35-33) state championship game in Kentucky in (1983), and it was one of the most exciting games I've ever seen," Smith said. "It was in Rupp Arena, and the gym was packed and it was triple overtime....And it was the little town against the big town. It was a great game to watch...Most slow-down games aren't like that."



# A. The landscape

The landscape of amateur basketball in the United States continues to change rapidly, particularly in Youth Basketball. There are so many people, leagues, programs, and organizations vying for a spot in the marketplace that it can be overwhelming, as there are so many voices with differing messages and it is hard to know what to do. Some say that Youth Basketball is in a state of crisis.

# Consider some of Today's Realities

The United States Sports Association, or USSSA, is a nonprofit with 501(c)(4) status, a designation for organizations that promote social welfare. According to its most recent available IRS filings, it generated \$13.7 million in revenue in 2015, and the CEO received \$831,200 in compensation. The group holds tournaments throughout the nation, and it ranks youth teams in basketball, baseball, and softball. The softball rankings begin with teams age 6 and under. Baseball starts at age 4.

Youth sports is a 15.3 billion dollar industry. A huge number of people have created products, programs, or events to lure parents and players to make money as a

Youth sports travel is scoring big as communites across the country build sports complexes to draw youngsters and parents to their sites as a method of economic development.

Many parents sincerely believe that their child will only be able to afford college if they get a basketball scholarship. The rumors and myths have become a reality to many.

There are national tournaments for teams as young as third grade.

Only 1 in 10,000 high school athlets get a partial college athletic scholarship.

# **B.** The Objective

The objective of this document is to ensure the over-all well-being of people participating in youth basketball. The NHSBCA's sole desire is to help amateur basketball players and parents better understand the landscape, help them develop a process to navigate and enjoy the game of basketball, and provide them with resources to find the best information and organizations available.

# The NHSBCA hopes this package will help parents and players as well as all interested in the game to...

- 1. Understand some of the basics and get the big picture view of amateur basketball in the United States.
- 2. Know where and how to find reliable and accurate information to aid in making informed decisions.
- 3. Develop a process to make informed decisions based on facts rather than fiction.

# C. What does research say about why kids play sports?

Research shows that the number 1 reason kids play sports is to have fun.

 Getting playing time.
 Playing well together as a team.

# D. Thoughts from the NHSBCA to parents:

- 1. A "Sports Parent" might be someone whose life is controlled by athletic events. It is as if youth sports have taken over everything for kids and parents.
- 2. Keep in mind that a major reason youth stop playing sports is the parental pressure involved with playing a sport.
- 3. Try to make decisions based on fact and personal research, rather than on rumors and what other parents tell you "you must" do for your child.
- 4. There may be no single factor driving the professionalization of youth sports more than the dream of free college conveyed to/by parents.
- 5. Your child needs to feel your support, not your interest in wins and performance. Youth play sports to have fun, and that should be important to their parents as well.
- 6. Some kids feel that one of the most unpleasant parts for a youngster playing sports is the ride home with parents.
- 7. Parents should make sure that the people working with their child are competant and that conditions are safe and should go watch D1, D2, and D3 college games in their area to see the level of play.
- 8. Consider how good your kid is and who said so... Has your child reached puberty? This makes a difference. Is your child: Elite? All-star? Top 100? A phenom? <- These terms are used by many to get the attention of a young athlete and their parents.
- 9. Seek an honest and unbiased evaluation on a player's ability and how likely it is they can achieve their goal.
- 11. Academic success is very important as well.
- 12. The NHSBCA endorses programs such as the *Power of Positive Coaching Alliance*. We recommend visiting their website: https://www.positivecoach.org/.

# E. Consider some realities about college recruiting

There may be no single factor driving the professionalization of youth sports more than the dream of free college conveyed by

College organizations (NCAA, NAIA, and NJCAA) have rules, guidelines, and restrictions as to when college coaches may recruit future players. The college organizations provide people lots of FREE information about the recruiting process.

A wide variety of individuals and businesses are angling to make a profit from the recruiting process. All kinds of promises are made to kids

The proliferation of youth coaches, teams, leagues, camps, recruiting services, specialization coaches, and exposure events is driven by the goal of "BEING SEEN" by college coaches.

"Agents" are third party people who try to influence the player and or player's parents in regard to college choice. They might say, "If you play on this travel team or go to this event, you will be seen."

It is critical that parents and players understand only a minute percent of high school players play on college teams. The problem is that people don't understand the process and how difficult it is to achieve.








**Figure 1.** This figure shows the estimated probability (in percentage) of playing in the NCAA out of a sample of 546,428 high school players.




**Figure 2.** This figure shows the estimated probability of playing men's pro basketball.

**Figure 3.** This figure shows the estimated probability (in percentage) of playing in the NCAA out of a sample of 429,380 high school players.




**Figure 4.** This figure shows the estimated probability of playing women's pro basketball.

- H. Consider the rise of the youth sports industry and its financial impact on families From TIME Magazine article, August 24th, 2017, "How Kids' Sports Became a \$15 Billion Industry
- 1. A range of private businesses are mining this deep, do-anything parental love, causing the nation's youth-sports industry to grow by 55% since 2010.
- 2. Major media and retail companies are investing in technology that manages peewee schedules.
- 3. Parents have used GoFundMe to help pay for the travel expenses.
- 4. Companies do things like process payments for club teams, offer performance analytics for seventh-grade hoops games and provide digital social platforms for young athletes.
- 5. The national retailer *Dick's Sporting Goods* has acquired companies that specialize in online scheduling and score tracking for youth sports.
- 6. Last year NBC bought Sport Ngin, a scheduling and social app that has raised \$39 million in venture funding, and rechristened it SportsEngine. In August, SportsEngine launched a searchable directory of more than 100,000 youth-sports camps, teams and leagues.
- 7. TIME's parent company launched *Sports Illustrated Play* after acquiring three youth-sports-software startups. *SI Play's* apps now has 17 million monthly unique users. According to SI Play CEO in the past 18 months, investors have plowed over \$1 billion into the youth-sports market.
- 8. Westfield, IN issued \$70 million in bonds to build Grand Park Sports Campus, a 400-acre complex that opened in 2014 and includes 31 grass and synthetic fields for soccer, lacrosse and other field sports, 26 softball and baseball diamonds, and a 370,000-square-foot indoor facility. The city is hoping that tax revenue generated by new hotels, retail outlets and medical facilities near the park will eventually pay off the debt. In 2016, the facility had 1.5 million total visitors and put \$162.6 million into the local economy.
- 9. Opening soon is the Sports KingDome, a facility with 347,000 sq. ft. of indoor space--enough to fit a dozen multisport fields, or six Little League baseball fields is slated to open on the site of a former IBM campus in East Fishkill, N.Y., some 70 miles north of New York City. It will become one of the largest domes on the planet, and the owner plans to auction naming rights to the highest bidder. The \$25 million, all-weather complex will allow families in the populous northeastern U.S. to play travel soccer, lacrosse and baseball 12 months a year, just like they do in the Sun Belt.
- 10. Basketball is pricing out a lot of its player base between exorbitant fees for gym time, travel expenses for travel teams, trainers fee, etc. A kid today who wants to be good has few outlets to improve without a major financial investment.

# Four A's to "recognize value" and "eliminate junk"



Additional questions to ask any coach/trainer/organization: provided by Greg Flynn, Basketball Coaches of NY

- 1. Is this person someone your school coach knows/trusts/communicates with? If not, are they willing to?
- 2. Is this person a high character individual with a good reputation locally? Are they willing to let you talk to their current clients about their experience?
- 3. Will this person be conducting sessions in small groups/individually or are they just trying to fill a gym to maximize revenue? If it will be small groups training, what will the variance in player attributes be (size, gender, age, skill level, etc.)?
- 4. Do they have experience training players of the same age, size, skill level, etc.
- 5. Are they making promises/claims (scholarships, playing time, starting role, etc.) if you train with them? If they are, are they willing to put those promises/claims in writing?
- 6. What kind of feedback and growth measurements will they provide you? Will there be a long-term plan, or just a series of workouts?
- 7. Where will training be located? Will it be a consistent location, or will it be floating based on availability? What is their cancellation policy (whether they cancel or you have to)? Do they work with another trainer who can fill in if they have a conflict arise? How do the questions above apply to that trainer?
- 8. How is my child's confidence and self-esteem going to be impacted by joining this team? Will my child be treated with respect and grow as a person?

From the NBA

The NBA and USA Basketball have teamed up to develop the first-ever youth basketball guidelines aimed at improving the way children, parents and coaches experience the game, with a specific emphasis on promoting player health and wellness.





These guidelines have received the endorsement of youth-focused organizations that collectively reach tens of millions of youth, including Boys & Girls Clubs of America, YMCA of the USA, National Recreation and Parks Association, JCC Association, National High School Basketball Coaches Association, and Positive Coaching Alliance. The NCAA also supports these guidelines as being in the best interest of the sport and the health and well-being of the youth basketball community. Additionally, these guidelines have received the endorsement of Adidas, Nike, and Under Armour.

In the spring of 2016, the NBA and USA Basketball established three expert working groups focused on the following areas: Health and Wellness, Playing Standards, and Curriculum and Instruction. Their work was endorsed by the Jr. NBA Leadership Council, which is chaired by Retired U.S. General Martin E. Dempsey and consists of prominent basketball influencers and stakeholders.

The Health and Wellness working group drafted a scientific paper that makes eight key recommendations for promoting a positive and healthy youth basketball experience. Highlights include:

### a. Delay single-sport specialization in the sport of basketball until age 14 or older

Participation in multiple sports in early childhood is beneficial from a player health and player development perspective. Athletes that reach the highest level of achievement are more likely to have played multiple sports at a young age and delayed single-sport specialization until late adolescence.

a. Limit high-density scheduling based on age-appropriate guidelines

High-density competition scheduling can increase risk for injury and burnout. Parents, coaches and event directors should be cautious in considering tournaments that schedule multiple competitive events (i.e., games) in short periods of time.

b. Ensure rest from organized basketball at least one day per week, extended time away from organized basketball each year, and adequate sleep each night

Daily rest is important for injury prevention, sport development and overall health. Rest days should be taken each week, and extended time off should be taken each year for physical recovery as well as to recharge oneself psychologically. Such an approach, along with getting the recommended amount of sleep, helps to maintain motivation for continued participation.
