## Preparing for the 2022-2023 Season

As we all know, during competition the decision-making of officials is always subject to public opinion. As a result, referees find that they are often criticized and questioned on their decisions and game management skills. Good referees can make sporting events flow well with the ability to create a positive environment that is focused on sportsmanship and competition. Poor officiating, with games constantly being interrupted by unnecessary fouls and penalties can spoil the enjoyment of the game for players, coaches and fans.

To be a successful official, it is important to be proficient in the following areas: game knowledge, decisionmaking skills, psychological skills, strategic skills, communication skills, and physical fitness.

• Game knowledge includes knowing the rules, understanding proper officiating mechanics, and understanding the basic strategy of the game.

• Decision-making skills are defined as how quickly and accurately a referee is able to make decisions that require the accuracy of judgement calls, and being firm in those decisions.

• Psychological skills are defined as focusing attention and concentration, staying cool under pressure, and recovering quickly from a difficult or wrong call. These are almost identical to the skills that athletes need to possess. Sports psychology is an important component which we all need to master.

• Strategic skills tend to focus on making the right interpretation of the game and its rules. Strategic skills include being able to stay up with the play, getting in the proper angle for correct decisions, and anticipating game actions.

• Communication skills means having the ability to professionally discuss situations with players, coaches and other members of your crew.

• Physical fitness is an absolute requirement to be an effective official. If you have a level of pride in your work, officials need to be as committed to fitness as athletes are as they prepare for their season.

Even if officials are well versed in these six categories, challenges faced during competition can interfere with performance. Obstacles may occur such as working with an uncooperative officiating partner(s), inclement weather, intense coaches and athletes, and unruly fans. Do your best to anticipate these issues and others as you prepare for the 22-22 season.

Finally, a note of appreciation from the WBCA Executive Board for your efforts as a Basketball Official. You are an extremely important component in this great game of Basketball played by thousands of student-athletes each year. Make it a great experience for everyone involved.

# Honoring the Game

Like many of the members of the Executive Board of the Wisconsin Basketball Coaches Association I have grown more concerned about the incidents we have witnessed surrounding high school basketball and activities in general. This year the behavior of fans and some players has demonstrated a lack of respect and civility toward opponents and officials. My question is: Should the WBCA step into this area of concern with a clear public statement and provide some resources for schools and coaches in confronting the challenge?

In my opinion our sport (as well as others) is getting caught up in the caustic attitude reflected by our adult citizens regarding how to handle emotional disagreements. The sportsmanship statement read before games seems to be losing impact on our crowds. Historically, as coaches, players and fans we have disagreed with calls or lack of calls but we were able to move forward without creating an incident that became violent or unsafe. If basketball is going to survive as a spectator sport and as an extension of the classroom, we need to address the dysfunctional direction before we have more uncivil situations. In my five decades of coaching, I seldom if ever doubted the positive impact that our sport had on our players. I saw positives within the school and community as a result of the players involvement in basketball. I realize society has been changing, however, the basic positive qualities that athletes get from being involved in athletics provide a foundation for their future success in life. Some of those qualities are being able to handle tough situations, stressful issues, celebrating success in a mature manner and dealing with failure as an opportunity to reflect on what they need to do to improve.

It's a bit uncomfortable to bring politics into our discussion but it has created a climate that seems to support caustic disagreement. Politicians continue to make an attempt to hijack local education in an effort to get talking points for their political futures. I have heard politicians weigh in on athletics and the discussion even goes to the youth sports level. I think it is important for us to make a clear statement about our sport and how it can continue to be mainstay to developing responsible citizens. As coaches we have much on our plate but in unison and cooperation with the entire school community I think we are responsible to make sure our athletes grasp the essence of sportsmanship and respect for our opponents. We understand high level of competition and we know it brings out the best in our athletes and at times the worst. Our guidance in those tough times is important. The problem, of course, is often outside of the teams and outside of our control. Those situations need to be confronted directly by those responsible for game management, but we can all work at making the climate of a game positive. I have included a few ideas and some can be used if appropriate:

1. Prior to game officials and coaches can greet each other in the middle of the gym so fans see the respect individuals have for each other.

2. An athlete from each team together can share a welcome and encouragement for the student fans and adults to support their team and respect the other team.

3. Pre-season parent meeting with athletes and coaches sharing the expectations at events.

4. Booster club member or parent can address crowd when teams go in before game.

5. Principal and respected staff member can share with students in smaller groups or assembly the expectation of respectful behavior at all events.

The members of our Board are successful coaches with a great deal of experience. I am sure they have done things that work. I share these thoughts in hopes of beginning a discussion to address the climate that we are all dealing with.
