WBCA Executive Board Minutes from January 21, 2024 "Zoom" Meeting

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 p.m. by Jerry Petitgoue, Executive Director.

Attendance was taken. Those absent were: Pat Bell, Jack Hervert, Mark Evenstad, Jason Martzke and Luke Francois.

The new board members were recognized: Luke Francois, Administrative Position (Appointed); Dan Wandrey, D1 Boys Rep; Andy Braunel, D1 Girls Rep; Jim Reuter, D2 Girls Rep; Paula Shedivy, D3 Girls Rep; Kim Weber, D4 Girls Rep; Kaleen McGettigan, D5 Girls Rep; Marquis Hines, AD Rep; and Scott Emerich, TV Media Rep. Brad Rohling was reelected as D3-Boys Rep.

The financial report, which was emailed in advance to all members, was reviewed.

All-Star Game Update: Loren Homb mentioned that all of the girls' coaches have been selected. He also stated that if, by May 1st, the coaches have not reached their goals, then they would be asked to send a check for \$750 to cover their goals and it would be returned to them when they actually reached their online goals. The amount to be raised by athletes participating in the games has also been raised from \$500 to \$600. Mike Huser said that the above goals and rules will also be followed for the boys. Matt McGraw stated that he is working on a 3-point contest during the games which will have all-star players as the participants. They are also working on possibly having a "Spirit Squad". Dave Royston said that there will be a dedication of the Jerry Petitgoue statue at the JAG in conjunction with the all-star games.

Hall of Fame: The list of those selected for the 2024 Hall of Fame Induction Class has been sent to all the board members. Joan Petitgoue will send out all the appropriate materials to the inductees. The banquet will take place on Sunday, September 29th, 2024 at the Glacier Canyon Lodge of the Wilderness Resort in Wisconsin Dells. Cocktails are at 12:00 Noon, dinner at 1:00 p.m. and the program to follow.

All-State/Academic All-State Banquet: The banquet will be held on Sunday, April 14th, 2024 at Glacier Canyon Lodge of the Wilderness Resort in Wisconsin Dells at 1:00 p.m. Travis Wilson and Jerry Petitgoue are working to propose a list of candidates for "College Players of the Year" in several categories and divisions. They will be asking college coaches and executive board members for any names they might have. The list will then go to the executive board for a vote. The selected players will be recognized at the All-State banquet this year rather than the Hall of Fame banquet.

Legacy Awards: Cliff Thompson stated that Loren Homb has been chosen as this year's recipient from the executive board and they are working on the selection of the boy and girl recipient. All awards will be presented at All-State/Academic All-State banquet this year.

Jerry Petitgoue Invite: Jeff Boos has agreed to be in charge of the boys invite and Kim Weber will head up the girls invite.

Jerry Petitgoue Legacy Award: Jeff Boos is working with a committee to develop some criteria for the development of this award.

Mental Health Clinic: Chris Zwettler and Bill Freitag (part of our zoom meeting) discussed the upcoming clinic held in Mount Horeb on April 6th. It will also be possible to attend by "zoom". More information will be forthcoming on the web.

Website Changes: Travis Wilson will be taking over the website on wissports.net now, except for banquets and the HOF. He will take over the membership in August.

Mr./Miss Basketball: Jerry stated that a new sponsorship is needed for both Mr. Basketball and Miss Basketball. Jerry and Jon Nedelcoff have a potential sponsor and will be meeting with them in the near future. Dennis Uppena, boys chair, and Niki Sutter, girls' co-chair, said they have narrowed their searches to the top six and will have them ready for a vote right after the sectionals.

Special Needs Scholarships: Randy Storlie stated that they will use the same criteria as last year from which the committee will select their candidates and make their choices. He will get a letter to Joan to proof and then it can be sent out to former HOF members.

Executive Board: Jon Nedelcoff and Jay Benish are working on a chart which depicts jobs that the WBCA is responsible for filling. WIAA Coaches Advisory Meeting: Todd Fergot asks that you get any concerns you have to him ASAP. Issues at hand are: shot clock, halves/quarters, expansion of the state tournament.

WIAA Contact Days: Terry Slack said that we will be in contact with Mel Dow of the WIAA on this issue.

WIAA Report: June Jam: The girls will be held in Appleton on June 13-14. The boys will also be held in Appleton on June 21-23 (will be two of those days). Registration is already open.----Contact Days: Kate wishes to get a committee formed for this. Decisions will go across all sports.----Seeding: The future seeding committee meeting will happen in the spring. They want feedback after the tourney from coaches and athletic directors. -----Questions from the board: No new questions.

New Business: Jon Nedelcoff asked that everyone on the board work hard to try and get names for new potential corporate sponsors.

WBCA announces Steven Clark and Alana Durtschi as recipients of the Legacy Leadership Award

The Wisconsin Basketball Coaches Association has announced Stevie Clark of Oshkosh North and Alana Durtschi of Albany/Monticello as the 2024 student recipients of the Legacy Leadership Award.

The award was established in 2019 to honor the legacy, leadership, and lives of WBCA Executive Board members John Cary (former MACC Fund director), Jerry Petitgoue (state's winningest coach & WBCA Executive Director), and David Royston (founder of JustAGame Fieldhouse) in recognition of their leadership qualities, characteristics in interpersonal relationships, and achievement as Board members.

The WBCA-MACC Fund Legacy Award will be given annually to an Executive Board member and senior student who demonstrates the exemplary qualities of Character, Courage, and Service. Loren Homb of Watertown was previously selected as the Executive Board recipient of the award this year.

LEGACY LEADERSHIP AWARD: BOYS PLAYER – STEVEN CLARK, OSHKOSH NORTH

Supporting information from Oshkosh North coach Brad Weber:

I am writing to nominate Class of 2024 Steven Clark from Oshkosh North High School for the WBCA Legacy Leadership Award. Stevie is a great candidate for this award because of his continued contributions to the game of basketball, our community, and his school. He exemplifies what this award embodies by showing strong character, courage in the face of adversity, and a dedication to others through service. I encourage you to strongly consider him based off of his approach and behaviors.

Stevie's character traits are revealed through his actions. Since I have known him, he has been an active member in our schools. He



has gone back to his elementary school and read to the current students. He has given presentations to his old middle school to promote finding your passion and pursuing it. Stevie is a member of our Polaris Honor Society and a member in our FFA club. He also pours into the basketball community by being a 3-year captain our varsity team, mentoring our captains on the subvarsity level, as well as helping out with our youth program at practices and camps.

Another area where Stevie's strong character traits are demonstrated is within his family. He is an integral caretaker for two foster medical children which their family has adopted. Besides being a great big brother, he knows how to work all the machines including a home oxygen concentrator, gtube machine, mobile oxygen tanks etc. He also helps to drive his other siblings, who have visual disabilities, and is now a paid respite provider! These actions and behaviors are unique in our society, especially for a teenager.

Stevie has always been confident in who he is. One thing that people are always amazed to hear is that he is a beekeeper. Bee keeping is a passion of his and he is not afraid of what others will say. He experienced bullying in middle school; a combination of his dad being the head coach in the district as well as him having unique interests that differ from the norm. Another unique development from being a beekeeper is that Stevie discovered that he is allergic to bees! Not only did this not stop him from following his passion it also created more opportunities to show courage. He now goes to get shots from the doctor to build up an immunity to it. More than once, he has had a scary reaction to the dosage, yet he keeps coming back for the shots and working with the bees. Stevie has oozed courage throughout his development into the person he is.

If you look at all of the examples that have been provided you will see that Stevie's life is centered around serving others. Service within the education community. Service with students and players. Service for the environment. Stevie has already researched the Colgate University community to see where he can become involved next year when gets to campus. He is more than a basketball player! He is an invested member in all of his environments.

LEGACY LEADERSHIP AWARD: GIRLS PLAYER – ALANA DURTSCHI, ALBANY/MONTICELLO

Supporting information from Albany/Monticello coach Derik Doescher:

"There are three essentials to leadership: Clarity, courage, & humility." I can't think of a better quote to summarize the leadership of Alana Durtschi of Albany HS. For four years, Alana has epitomized everything that a coach & athletic director looks for in a basketball player.



Alana's leadership on the basketball court has led to countless individual & team successes

and awards. At the halfway point of her senior year, Alana is a two-time all-conference player, POY in the conference as a junior, D5 WBCA first team all-state as a junior, over 1,000-point scorer, two-time team MVP, and has led the "Lady Comets" to three consecutive regional championships, three sectional finals, and the first ever STATE appearance in school history as a junior in 2023.

What overshadows all of these basketball accolades is the most humble, giving, dedicated, & empathetic student athlete I've ever been around. Alana Durstchi is all of these on a daily basis. As a junior, Alana and a teammate decided to help out our youth basketball organization with finances that had been depleted largely due to COVID years. Alana Durtschi and Abby Hollis spearheaded a 3 vs. 3 tournament hosted at Albany HS

called the "COMET CLASSIC." Alana and her teammate did all of the planning, organizing, advertising, & facilitating of the tournament. The inaugural tournament in 2022 raised \$1,900.00 for the Junior Comet League Youth Basketball organization. This last November of 2023 was the 2nd Annual "COMET CLASSIC" that raised over \$3,800.00 for the JCL. ALL the money raised went back to the youth basketball organization. This money has helped numerous boys and girls in small rural Albany to have an affordable chance to play the game of basketball that has been such a big part of Alana's life. This example shows the CLARITY that Alana has. She understands the "BIG PICTURE" of life and what it means to help others. With the help of her teammate, she has the vision to find a way to have an impact and follow through with that vision.

Alana's freshman year of basketball, she was moved up to the varsity level right away. If you watched Alana play you would have never known. Since day one, she has had the courage to be a leader in the roughest stretches of the game, in the locker room, & in the hallways of AHS. This takes courage & usually isn't brought to fruition until one's junior or senior seasons. Not with Alana, it has been her courageous personality that has changed our entire program for the last four years.

I have countless stories of the humility side of Alana. I can honestly say, I have never met anyone, not even an adult as humble as this young lady. When she was approaching her 1,000 point during midway point of her senior season, it was NEVER talked about. Alana didn't want any attention drawn to her accomplishment. She never talked about it to the coaches, teammates, or friends. When she was named the POY Six Rivers Conference as a junior and first team all-state, she was appreciative, but deflected all the attention and rather put it back on the team. Her teammates adore her and follow her lead, not her lead through words, rather her lead through actions, work ethic, & humility.

In summary, the characteristics that Alana has led with have had a profound impact on the community of Albany and AHS. The high school has 82 students total in grades 9-12. Every little girl that walks the halls in our 4k-12th grade building wants to be like Alana. They see more than just a star basketball player. Alana is the class of 2024 valedictorian, she is a class officer, involved in NHS, Student Council, 4H where she shows animals in the local fair, along with also playing volleyball & softball for Albany High School. Alana is involved with the Albany United Methodist Church and has participated in numerous summer youth church mission trips. As a

father of three young daughters, I can proudly say that Alana is their hero & I thank her for being such a great role model to my children and all the children of the Albany Community. For all of these reasons I wholeheartedly recommend Alana Durtschi as a nominee of the WBCA Legacy Leadership Award.

Minnesota high school basketball is getting better because the clock is ticking

All of the improvements were on display this week when two of the top high school teams in the area played. One rallied from a huge deficit to win; both combined for more than 200 points and a thrilling finish.

FEBRUARY 1, 2024 — 9:51AM

Minnetonka trailed Hopkins by 27 points in the first half of a boys basketball game on Tuesday. That lead dwindled to one point with less than 10 seconds to play.

Not only did Minnetonka erase a deficit that looked insurmountable, the Skippers won without having to foul in the final seconds.

The likelihood of that exact scenario unfolding before this season would have been minuscule. It was further proof that the arrival of the 35-second shot clock has been a game-changer for the good in Minnesota basketball.

Everything about the high school game has improved. More scoring, better pace to games, less dilly-dallying with the ball, an increase in coaching strategy.

The pitch clock in Major League Baseball improved the product by whittling time off games. The shot clock has made basketball games more entertaining by improving the tempo and flow.

Cherry High boys coach Jordan Christianson was watching video of two future opponents from Wisconsin earlier this season. Those teams didn't play under shot clock rules. Christianson was struck by what he saw.

"One team ran the flex [offense] for three minutes straight," Christianson said.

Thank heavens Minnesota is done with that nonsense.

I saw it frequently over nearly 25 years of watching high school basketball in this state. Teams would have possessions that lasted a minute to several minutes as they searched for a perfect shot, tried to lull the defense to sleep or attempted to shrink the game against a superior

opponent. They ran their offense with no real urgency to score, which made for boring basketball.

That's no longer an option.

"The shot clock forces coaches to make adjustments and players to make plays," Minnetonka boys coach Bryce Tesdahl said. "That's how basketball is supposed to be played."

Tesdahl's team provided a case study on the shot clock's impact. Though not impossible, erasing a 27-point deficit would be a tall order without a shot clock.

Leading by 1, Hopkins inbounded the ball with 41 seconds remaining, meaning Minnetonka did not have to foul to get the ball back. Hopkins missed a shot with seven seconds left and Minnetonka raced for a winning layup with less than a second on the clock. The teams combined for 204 points in regulation.

"The game is a lot different, late-game especially," Wayzata boys coach Bryan Schnettler said.

Players have adjusted nicely. I've attended 15-20 games this season between boys and girls and probably can count on one hand the number of shot clock violations witnessed. Occasionally, a player heaves up a rushed shot to beat the buzzer, but that doesn't happen enough to be considered a drawback.

The shot clock has had minimal effect because these teams already played fast. Minnetonka girls coach Brian Cosgriff said his team has had only a few violations. Park Center's boys team recorded its first violation in its 19th game.

"In terms of being in a position where we felt rushed," Park Center coach James Ware said, "that really hasn't happened much."

Park Center's star guard Cash Chavis, headed to play at Washington next season, said he enjoys the shot clock, except for one minor gripe.

"It's easier for [opponents] to score more now," he said.

That's true for everybody. Schnettler examined his team's stats and found a negligible difference in points per possession allowed this season compared to previous years.

"There's just more possessions in the game," he said, which is why the defending state champions are allowing more points.

The shot clock invites new in-game strategy too. Coaches can look for two-for-one opportunities at the end of each half. Teams that are trailing know they will get more possessions to make defensive stops, rather than being forced to press or foul. That prevents games from turning into free-throw contests in the final minutes.


"It was a much-needed change," Schnettler said. "And moving forward it's just going to help kids continue to develop and get better."

Minnesota high school basketball has gained national respect in the past two decades for its depth of talent and frequency in producing highly rated recruits. However, the state trailed others in implementing the shot clock.

"I'm super glad we finally got there," Ware said.

The payoff is worth it. As much as it thrived before, Minnesota basketball now is even better.

YOU MUST BE A TEAM PLAYER

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Last week in Issue #251 (Establishing Clear Expectations: Coach Wooden's Letter to the Team (Part One)) we discussed the value of establishing clear expectations for a team and how part of Coach Wooden's method for doing this was through his preseason letter to the team.



We reviewed excerpts from the 1970, 71, 72 preseason letters to the team and presented three that Coach covered. Here are three more topics.

4. Coach made clear how playing time would be decided. Here's an excerpt from the 1971 letter:

Although I am very interested in each of you as an individual, when you are on the practice floor my interest in you is only as a part of our team. Your position or situation on our team will depend upon how you perform in comparison with your teammates. Your race or religion will have no bearing on my judgment, but your ability and how it works into my philosophy of team play definitely will. Furthermore, your personal conduct and adherence to standards that I make, undoubtedly will be taken into consideration, either consciously or subconsciously.

5. Coach made it clear to the players how they should expect to be treated. From the 1970 letter:

There may be double standards at times as I most certainly will not treat you all alike in every respect. However, I will attempt to give each individual the treatment that he earns and deserves according to my judgment and in keeping with what I consider to be in the best interest of the team. You must accept this in the proper manner if you are to be a positive contributing member of the team, whether you are one who gets to play a lot or very little. If I do not feel there was a place where you could contribute, I would not want you to waste your time and, if you do not feel that you are a part of the team as a whole, then you should drop out. Although I prefer to go too far with a player rather than not far enough, I will drop

I believe that no good shall be lost, and that all man has willed or hoped or dreamed of good shall exist forever.







Instead of screening up for 1, 2 fakes it and screens for 4 and then comes off screen from 5. 3 reads the defense and looks for best option.
